Sunday Brunch Sunday, March 9th

Join us in the main dining room for our members Sunday Brunch. There are many brunch items to choose from off the menu. Dress is casual.

DIYC Culture: Kindly place your orders at the walk-up counter. The coffee, tea, and water station, as well as setups and cleanup, are all self-serve. We kindly ask that you take your dishes and glassware to the bus station after your meal. When DP Davis developed Davis Islands, he formed a Davis Islands Yacht Club with Ceasar Irsch, his "Director of Activities" as Commodore. For several years (1925 & 1926) they sponsored a regatta for power boats, one class of which was known as The Tampa Babies – mahogany "725 Cubic inch runabouts". Apparently, the Club ceased to function when the land bust occurred, but the idea didn't die.

History of the Sailingest Club in the South

In the early 1930's, the sailors in Tampa had developed a sailboat class known as the "Tampa Bay 16-Footer". There were no restrictions as to equipment, sails, hiking boards, etc., except that the boat could not exceed 16 feet. The sailboat became one of the first class boats raced in Tampa Bay and resulted in some of the keenest competition in our history. This group of sailors called themselves the Tampa Sailing Squadron.

In 1933 the group was chartered as The Tampa Sailing Squadron and by a coin toss, Bobbie C. Davis was "elected" the first Commodore. One of its early locations was the caretaker's cottage behind the Davis Island Tennis Court.

In 1935 the Sailing Squadron moved to Marjory Park and on August 15, 1941, it changed its name to Davis Island Yacht Club. In 1935 the Club began the sponsorship of the first long distance coastal sailing race on the West Coast of Florida, the "Egmont Key Race". It has been run annually since 1935 except for the war years.

In 1942 the Club ceased to function actively as all the members had answered the call of their country to serve in World War II and the Clubhouse was leased to the Coast Guard. It was approximately 1946 before the Club began to function again.

In the mid 1940's, Davis Island Yacht Club undertook the sponsorship of two major regattas-the Gasparilla Regatta and the Thanksgiving Regatta and today the Thanksgiving Regatta is one of the largest class regattas sponsored on the West Coast of Florida. In 1947, Lightning Fleet #164 constructed some docks in the Seaplane Basin and they were the first docks for sailing located there. In the late 1940's DIYC had obtained some lots from the city on the end of Davis Island to eventually build a clubhouse on the location.

In 1955, after much negotiation with the City of Tampa, including legislation in Tallahassee in order for the land and water surrounding it be available for sailing activities, they traded those lots for a lease from the City of Tampa for the strip of land on the south end of the Seaplane Basin for a club house. After a bond issue to fund the construction, the Clubhouse was completed in 1956 on the southern tip of Davis Islands.



In 1960, after a second bond issue and retirement of the first bond issue, more construction was planned. The facilities at DIYC underwent a major expansion adding the present swimming pool, seawall and the initial docks at the Club as well as enlarging the kitchen facilities. Since then porches were added, the bar was expanded, the docks and dry slips were expanded, and two hoists were added, one with a floating dock. Over time, the Club's lease with the city was renegotiated and it now extends to 2041.

In the late 1980's and beyond, DIYC began hosting some new sailing events. In 1989, the Old Shoe Regatta began, a single-handed, no-class regatta. DIYC began hosting the Morgan Invasion in 2006, a regatta organized around boats designed by Charley Morgan. 2010 saw both the first Hangover Bowl, a regatta scheduled for January 1st, and the resurrection of the Tampa to Ft. Myers distance race. In 2013, DIYC hosted the first Hospice Cup in conjunction with the 28th Annual Morgan Invasion and raised \$100,000 in 2024.

In 2002 it became apparent that the existing Clubhouse would have to be replaced. As a result, a Building Committee was formed, plans were drawn up and financing was obtained. The existing Clubhouse was torn down in October 2003, a triple-wide trailer was moved in for temporary quarters and the groundbreaking ceremony for the new building was held on November 7, 2003. On October 22, 2004 the new Clubhouse was dedicated.

In 2005, construction on the Tiki Bar and the Regatta Room was completed. The Regatta room is used as a classroom, for

regatta registration and as a meeting room. The Tiki Bar was removed after a few years and construction on the Regatta Bar and Pavilion area was completed in 2013. The extension for the bottom land lease on the DIYC property was signed in 2007 and a scoring hut was built out on the point. In 2015, a ramp for dinghy sailing on the Point was built and the floating docks were expanded and refurbished. Then in 2016, 8 slips on 'B' dock and 20 slips on 'C' dock were added along with power pods for electric and water.

DIYC member Jeff Linton received the 2007 US Sailing Rolex Yachtsman of the Year Award after winning the Lightning World Championship as well as other prestigious competitions. In 2011, The National Sailing Hall of Fame was formed with DIYC as one of the founding members.

In 2014, the first club launch Guardian was decommissioned and replaced with an Island Hopper 30 pilot house, Guardian II. The transom from Guardian, was mounted on the side of the clubhouse in December 2016 where the Tiki Bar stood. It is dedicated to the members that built her and the do-it-yourself spirit of the club.

From conquistadors to cattle ranchers, the Tampa Bay History Center is home to the Touchton Map Library, Columbia Café, and a collection of 90,000 historical artifacts. **Join us on Saturday from 1000 to 1130 for \$12 a person.**

Treasure Seekers, Pirates, Conquistadors, & Shipwrecks:

A guided tour of the Tampa History Center in Downtown Tampa on the Riverwalk



Explore Florida's history with a tour featuring a 60-foot, 18th-century pirate ship, showcasing explorers, conquistadors, and pirates like Hernando de Soto, "Calico" Jack Rackham, and Anne Bonny. Learn about the perilous waters where treasure-laden ships sank and discover artifacts from the 1600s. A highlight is the Mapping the American Sea exhibit, featuring a rare 1524 map that is the first to show Florida and the Gulf of Mexico accurately, marking a major achievement in cartography. Conclude with a visit to the Touchton Map Library, home to thousands of historical maps.

A taste of History

Optional lunch at The Columbia Café in the Tampa History Center - Riverwalk

Join us for an a la carte lunch after the tour at 1145. Located at the Tampa Bay History Center on the Riverwalk, the Columbia Café brings the charm and flavor of the original Columbia Restaurant in Ybor City. Founded in 1905 by Cuban immigrant Casimiro Hernandez Sr., the Columbia is Florida's oldest restaurant and the world's largest Spanish restaurant. Enjoy Spanish- and Cuban-inspired classics like the "1905" Salad, Chicken and Yellow Rice "Ybor," and the Cuban Sandwich, all served in a space featuring historic touches, including chairs from Tampa's first air-conditioned dining room. The Columbia Café is still family-owned by the Hernandez Gonzmart family. **Reservations with the group are required.**

Guest Speaker Chip Merlin & Crew of Merlin Yacht Racing

Sailing The Dream

Conceived by a Wizard, Hatched in a Chicken Coop, Flying Fast and Fun, Merlin was born for the Transpac!

Join some of the crew of the iconic Merlin and the owner, Chip Merlin, to hear stories of racing to Cuba, Mexico, Pensacola, Bermuda, and of course, Hawaii. The presentation will be interactive and engaging.

The team was established in 2017 after Chip Merlin, a Tampa based attorney and DIYC member, purchased the iconic sailboat from Bill Lee, the ship's creator. Chip has done quite a bit of east coast sailing, mostly in Annapolis, Maryland and Mobile, Alabama. His most recent program being the B-32 "Chips All In" sailing out of the Davis Island Yacht Club.

With the new crew, the boat sailed in its first race from St. Petersburg to Habana, Cuba, on February 26, 2018 and was first In Line Honours and first in its class.

Merlin Yacht Racing brings innovation and nostalgia to the sport of sailboat racing. With the boat weighing 24,000 pounds, a beam of 12 feet, and a sail area of 1,800 square feet, the hours of engineering that were spent to create the Merlin in 1977 made sailing a large ultralight-displacement boat something special – the motto "Fast is Fun" lives on.

Merlin represents the boundless enthusiasm of the seventies and the mystique of unconquered waters of today.
